

## Research and National Technical Assistance Programs

#### **Overview:**

The Research and National Technical Assistance Program (RNTA) works to fulfill EDA's mission through research and technical assistance projects that promote competitiveness and innovation in economic development in distressed regions throughout the United States and its territories. RNTA awards are national in scope, interest, and impact, and are facilitated by EDA Headquarters in Washington, DC through the Performance and National Programs Division (PNPD).

RNTA program consists of two separate programs funded through the same Notice of Funding Opportunity: The Research and Evaluation (R&E) and National Technical Assistance (NTA) Programs. The R&E Program provides funding to projects focused on using cutting-edge research to develop tools, recommendations, and resources that shape economic development policies and inform economic development decision-making. It also encompasses program evaluations to discover and assess the impact of previously funded projects. The NTA Program includes, but is not limited to, outreach, training, information dissemination, and other activities that are beneficial to the economic development community nationwide. It is similar to EDA's Local Technical Assistance projects but scaled to a national level.

- Support one or more of EDA's <u>Investment Priorities</u>
- · A need or demand within the economic development sphere
- Potential usefulness for local, regional, and state economic development practitioners
- Soundness and completeness of analytical demonstration of methodology and means of dissemination
- Value of proposed project in relation to funding amount





## **Funding Details:**

- For Fiscal Years 2018-2020, funding for the Research and Evaluation (R&E) Program totaled \$1.5 million annually and funding for the National Technical Assistance (NTA) Program totaled \$1.0 million annually.
- EDA anticipates a twelve (12) to eighteen (18) month project period subject to availability of funds, EDA policy, and satisfactory performance.
- Funding is awarded through Grants or Cooperative Agreements. Cooperative Agreements differ from Grants because they require "substantial involvement" on behalf of EDA.
- Applications are accepted and reviewed on a rolling basis.

## **Application Process:**

The RNTA Program employs a two-step application process: (1) the Concept Proposal and (2) the Full Application. EDA will only review Full Applications submitted by applicants who submitted a Concept Proposal. Any Full Application received from an applicant who did not submit a Concept Proposal will be deemed ineligible and not considered for funding.

- 1. Review the current NOFO. Prior to preparing a Full Application, potential applicants must submit a Concept Proposal to <a href="mailto:rnta@eda.gov">rnta@eda.gov</a>. The RNTA Team recommends potential applicants utilize the <a href="mailto:RNTA Project">RNTA Project</a> Concept Proposal and Budget Templates to develop their Concept Proposal.
- 2. EDA staff will review the Concept Proposal and provide feedback to the potential applicant by providing a letter with a recommendation of "encourage" or "discourage" to develop a Full Application. Regardless of this recommendation, any potential applicant who has submitted a Concept Proposal can develop a full application and will be given full and fair consideration.
- 3. The applicant will submit the Full Application through Grants.gov (www.grants.gov).
- 4. EDA Staff will conduct an eligibility and technical completeness review ("Technical Review") of the Full Application. If the project encompasses all necessary documentation, it will proceed to an Investment Review Committee (IRC). If the project does not include all necessary documentation, the applicant will be notified of application deficiencies.
- 5. During the IRC, a committee of at least three (3) federal employees will evaluate the application and recommend a Funding Decision.
- 6. After the IRC, the recommendation will be sent to the Grants Officer, who has the authority to accept or reject the IRC's recommended Funding Decision.
- 7. Applicant is notified of Funding Decision.
